ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Beth Ziebarth has a personal interest and professional responsibility in advocacy for people with disabilities. She currently serves as the director of Access Smithsonian.

In her position, Beth develops and implements accessibility policy and guidelines for the Institution's 19 museums, the National Zoo, and nine research centers, ensuring that the Smithsonian's 30 million annual visitors experience a welcoming environment that accommodates individuals of all ages and abilities.

Her work includes staff training on accessibility and disability topics, facility and program technical assistance, direct accessibility services, outreach and collaboration, and five signature programs for people with disabilities.

This session will provide an inside look into the newly restored and renovated Kansas City Museum set to open this fall. After almost 25 years, International Architects Atelier (IAA) has completed Stage I of the restoration and renovation of Corinthian Hall to create a 21st-century city museum that explores Kansas City's history and cultural heritage. There will be history- and humanities-based exhibitions, programs, events, experiences, and amenities such as a café, soda fountain, retail store, and theater. IAA overcame many challenges working with such an historic structure and its transformation to serve the needs of a contemporary museum.

In 2018, representatives of the Missouri Association of Museums and Archives (MAMA) traveled to Washington, D.C. for Museum Advocacy to meet with state representatives about supporting federal funding for museums and archives. MAMA representatives returned to Missouri and met with the Missouri Humanities Council to work towards creating a paid Diversity Internship program. 

1:15 – 2:00 PM Sharing New Formats Online: Viewing Domino Danzero's Original Stereograph Cards in 3D, from a Distance

During the pandemic shutdown, the Missouri State University Libraries' initiated a "digital first" policy, focusing on digital content and online services. For Special Collections and Archives, one such opportunity (along with special challenges) presented itself when a collection of original stereograph cards created by immigrant photographer Domino Danzero in 1900-1901 was loaned to MSU for digitization. How could we present these to an online and distant audience, without the need to handle the originals or use a stereoscope? The panel will discuss the lessons learned from this challenging project.

2:10 – 4:10 PM Museum Environment 101 Workshop

In this 2-hour session, participants will get an overview of the importance of environment for museum collections, both those on exhibit and in storage. We will discuss the effects of temperature, relative humidity, and light on various materials and go over the use of simple monitoring equipment including data loggers and light meters. Since many small and medium-sized collecting institutions have minimal HVAC systems for internal environmental controls, the use of seasonal set points and low-tech methods for handling trouble spots will be covered. Techniques for limiting light levels will also be discussed, as well as practical, low-cost steps that museum staff members may take for limiting light exposure to their collections. This workshop is designed for collections care professionals from a variety of backgrounds and training.

This session champions a revival and expansion of museum and archive internship opportunities for undergraduate students in the post-pandemic world. The panelists examine the challenges and rewards of archive and museum internships from multiple perspectives—a faculty member who coordinates student internships at various on-and off-campus sites, a graduate student who completed numerous internships as an undergraduate, and the head of an archive which offers many student internships. As well as exploring the pros and cons of returning to in-person internships after the recent period in which many internship programs have either been suspended or forced online, the panelists will also reflect upon how online practices during the pandemic facilitated innovations in the internship experience and expanded our vision of what might be possible in the future.

Missouri Remembers: Artists in Missouri through 1951 is a new freely available online website that documents visual artists who were active in Missouri and who have defined the state's artistic culture. Researchers from each partner institution, the Spencer Art Reference Library: The Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, Jannes Library: Kansas City Art Institute, and the St. Louis Public Library will share the unexpected twists, turns and connections they uncovered while working on this project.

This session will discuss how museums can approach the more difficult and hidden histories of their own communities. Using Julia Rose's Interpreting Difficult History at Museums and Historic Sites as a guide through this process, the session will present a pathway for museums to follow that (1) hopefully will ease the concerns that some museums and their stakeholders have in addressing topics such as slavery and lynchings and (2) will provide a model for visitor learning to help guide visitors through topics and approaches that may conflict with their own understandings. This session will also demonstrate how undergraduate students at Northwest Missouri State University have been able to follow this model to design exhibits and companion websites and lesson plans for the Nodaway County Historical Society.
